

ICELAND FOODS APPOINTS FIRST DIRECTOR OF REHABILITATION

- Paul Cowley MBE will spearhead a drive by the retailer to recruit more ex-offenders to work in Iceland Foods stores and warehouses.
- Already in the role, Paul Cowley has begun conducting interviews with men and women at HMP Styal and HMP Onley for potential roles, with many other prisons eager to be involved.
- In England and Wales, gaining meaningful employment following release from prison can cut rates of re-offending by 50% according to the Ministry of Justice.

7th September 2022: In line with its 'doing it right' philosophy, Iceland Foods, has kick-started a drive to support prisoners to secure employment when released, thus challenging soaring rates of re-offending. As the retailers first Director of Rehabilitation, Paul Cowley, will work out of the Iceland Foods Charitable Foundation, recruiting ex-offenders to work in Iceland's stores and warehouses.

Paul as a young man spent time in HMP Risley; he then went on to have a 17 year career in the British Army. On leaving, he became a personal trainer, managing prestigious health clubs in London. He then changed career to become a priest in the Church of England and in 2005 founded the charity Caring for Exoffenders which has helped over 2,000 men and women re-integrate into society and for which he was awarded an MBE in 2016.

With recruitment already underway, Paul has been interviewing men and women at HMP Styal and HMP Onley and plans to continue seeking recruits for roles with Iceland.

The recruitment scheme will be working in tandem with the Prison Employment Lead – a person employed by the government in every prison to develop connections between prisoners and businesses.

Paul Cowley, Director of Rehabilitation at Iceland Foods said: "Most people in our prison system are poorly educated and have a bad or non-existent employment record. This is not always their fault and the cumulative effect upon the families, dependents and their mental health can be life threatening. This initiative by Iceland Foods will present a prison leaver not only with the hope of a job, but the hope of a new life. I'm excited to be working with an innovative team who care about the marginalised and have the practical means to tap into the locked-up potential in our prisons."

According to data from the Ministry of Justice, two-thirds of prisoners have not been in employment or training prior to imprisonment and almost three-quarters have no paid employment upon release. Meanwhile, regular paid employment is one of the main factors in reducing reoffending. The cost of reoffending on society is estimated at around £18 billion per year.

Richard Walker, Managing Director of Iceland Foods said: "I'm thrilled to welcome Paul on board as Director of Rehabilitation to help us continue our 'doing it right' efforts. Helping give former prisoners meaningful employment is not only helpful to our business but will pass on wider societal benefits that have been proven time and again."
